April 23, 2017


- Meeting called to order
- New members introduced
- Quick discussion about Suri alpaca seconds fleece donated by the organizers of Carolina Alpaca Celebration
- Thanks for Hospitality participation by Dick Kistler, Janet Kaufman, and Ursula Blackburn.
- Thanks for Opportunity participation by Genie Greenlaw, Tammy Diener, Erica Blake and the estate of Catherine Sullivan.
- Sign-up sheet circulated for May meeting volunteers.
- Introduction of Ann Williams by Jim Williams
 - Jim Williams is affiliated with Mecklenburg Historical Society and is responsible for weekly emails, monthly postings of historical events in the area and periodic newsletter about local historic sites.
 - Ann Williams is an author on historical topics, fiber artist (particularly historically accurate weaving of the 19th century), textile researcher and interpreter, and researcher of all things 19th century history related to plantation living in the Carolinas.
 - In 1991, researched and accurately described “Mystery Dress” found at Historic Brattonsville, SC.
 - Found it was woven with natural cotton warp with weft stripes, also in cotton. This is a much more difficult process than weaving with warp stripes and the dress also had interesting construction features including Leg-O-Mutton sleeves created by cutting on the bias.
 - More recently, Ann has researched for and interpreted at various historic sites such as Latta Plantation. Ann has a passion for correctly interpreting life in an antebellum plantation as seen from all perspectives.
 - Most recent book, The Uncommon Bond of Julia and Rose, was based on the life of an 18th century plantation mistress and her personal slave.
 - Ann chose to write this book as a novel because she wanted to take the information she found out from primary resources about these kinds of relationships and set the story at the height of plantation farming.
 - Ann has a passion for debunking myths held by many about slave life and relations with their white masters. She feels that she was able to accomplish this within her book by researching carefully and including the results of her research in her story.
 - For example, many think that it was illegal to teach slaves to read. While Lutheranism does not encourage a close personal relationship with your beliefs through complete understanding, The Presbyterians felt that a person could best understand and commune spiritually with God if they understood His word, which they believed was best accomplished through a great understanding of religious texts. They would have therefore helped their slaves to read so they could better share their beliefs.
 - Ann’s other goal with her book was to show the relationship of mistress and slave through life experiences during the Spring and Summer of 1860, just before the election of Abraham Lincoln.
 - As the mistress, Julia, nears the end of her life, her son suggests that she write a will. In doing so, she secures care for her personal servant after her passing, though she sees little other purpose to this document. The mistress then begins to think back over her life and

decides to create a memory journal. Rose asks if she might also do this. Ann's book, then, is a collection of these entries from both these ladies in their individual voices and showing many of the same experiences from each of their perspectives.

- For reference about Rose's literary voice, Ann referred to documents from the WPA Slave Narrative Project where WPA members went into the mountain areas and spoke with slaves and documented their experiences in their own words.
- The backdrop for this book includes historically accurate events and shows how life changed for both master and slave as farming in the area changed from small farms with a few slaves to work the land to huge plantations where the number of slaves vastly outnumbered the white family members. There were conflicts that occurred on all sides as this change took place.
 - Ann sold signed copies of her book to Guild members.





Book Review – *Weaving for Beginners*, by Peggy Osterkamp

Carolina Fiber Frolic 2017

March 24, 25, and 26 brought the 8th Carolina Fiber Frolic to Sapphire, NC. The Frolic is our own Jan Smiley's fiber retreat. In the spring, there are classes to choose from; in the autumn, there are no classes, just lots of time for knitting, spinning, visiting, taking walks, and relaxing.

Once again, Burgl Pruett and I traveled together to the Frolic. We were surprised to see the road construction on Highway 64 as we approached Sapphire. That part of Hwy. 64 is full of switchbacks and tight turns. Apparently they are trying to straighten out some of the curves and make the road safer, but it is requiring many trees to be cut down. The local people are not happy about it.

While the weather was not particularly nice, we found the Hampton Inn as hospitable as ever. The retreat is held at the Sapphire Community Center, possibly a quarter of a mile from the Hampton Inn. Each year the classes vary as do the instructors. I took four classes, one about making a felted book cover which I really enjoyed, and three different knitting classes. There were vendors there from Oklahoma (Lost City Knits), Georgia (Kristen's Fiber Studio), and Baltimore (Neighborhood Knits), as well as Martha Owen from Brasstown, NC, who had a table with beautiful knitted garments, fiber, and interesting books in addition to her teaching several classes.

On Friday and Saturday of the retreat, lunch and dinner are provided. Jan's husband, Tom, gets better and better with his lasagna. Saturday night there is a 'fashion show' where people can show off their knitted garments. There is also a competition with several different categories including best project made from the previous spring Frolic's special color way. It is inspiring to see how people can come up with so many different ways to use the same starting material.

It is a very enjoyable weekend. I have been fortunate to attend all eight of the spring Frolics so far, but have only been able to attend one or two of the fall retreats. The dates for the 2017 fall retreat are November 10, 11, and 12. Jan will put out an announcement when she is ready to start taking registrations for the fall retreat.
